The Drama Day due to be held in July has been postponed until the Autumn. Apologies to those who were looking forward to this fun event and we will let you know the new date as soon as possible.

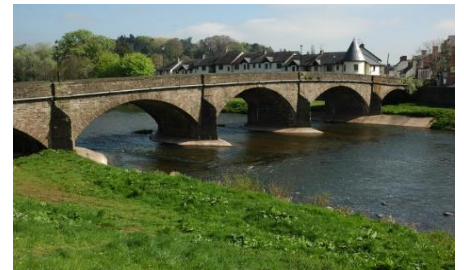


TRY OUR TEN QUIRKY QUIZ QUESTIONS ON USK!

A FOCUS ON THE GARDENING INTEREST GROUP

In the spring newsletter we told you that all of the interest groups were now up and running and there was an exciting program of events planned for members. In this newsletter we catch up with what has been happening in the Gardening Interest Group. After a spring spent mostly in the garden shed (otherwise known as Llangbyi Village Hall), the past two months have seen members getting out and about to take inspiration from gardens across the country.

In May, the Gardening Group visited Aberglasney in Carmarthen. Aberglasney is a wonderful restored garden with the added attraction of a ninfarium. The ninfarium was completed in 2005 when a glass roof was put over the middle of the mansion. Filled with subtropical plants and exotics it is a very surprising find when you open an ordinary door inside the house.



In June, a visit was arranged to the Garden of the Wind at Middle Hunt House, Hereford. The name of the garden is inspired by its open aspect to the Black Mountains and the westerly winds that present a challenge to gardening at this altitude.



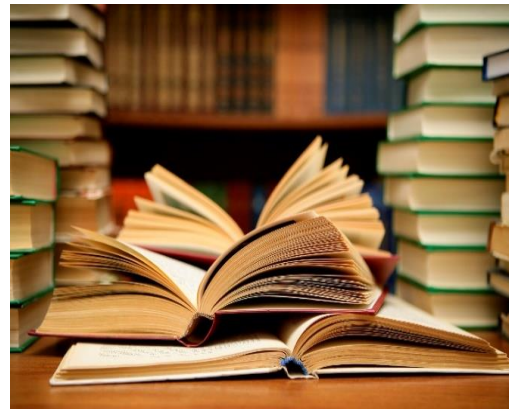
The gardens have been in development for over ten years and extend to approximately five acres with spectacular views over the Black Mountains. Members also enjoyed the garden's large collection of sculpture by British and Continental makers.

There is one more visit planned for July to a NGS garden in Llanover. Then there will be a break in August and the group will meet again in September to repeat the very successful 'Applefest' in a member's garden in Usk. After this event it is back to the garden shed for an exciting autumn programme!

IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO LEARN SOMETHING NEW

It was sad that my grandparents did not teach any of their 10 children to speak Welsh. Whilst in grammar school I drew a map of Monmouthshire with the Welsh names for towns and villages but never really tried to learn the language. At university in Aberystwyth and Bangor I never really made any effort although classes were readily available. After university I worked in England and in my first job three people regularly spoke Welsh together, but again I never tried to join in.



After spending about 40 years in England I returned to Wales in 2003 to where I live now, my family home. Some years later, I noticed an advert in the local paper for Welsh classes in Chepstow and I thought why not. So I joined the class with Coleg Gwent and I am still attending classes with them. By attending classes every week and joining as many activities as possible such as coffee mornings, weekend schools and summer school reading groups, I have now become reasonably fluent. Learning Welsh has allowed me to meet lots of people and it has given me a new social interest. It has been a great challenge which has kept my brain active. At the moment classes with Coleg Gwent are still on-line but hopefully this will soon be changing with some classes face to face and some still online. On-line classes/activities have allowed me to talk (in Welsh) with people in Australia, Canada, Belgium, Switzerland, Patagonia, USA.

Coleg Gwent classes are available through the web site [Dysgu Cymraeg.com](http://DysguCymraeg.com). There are also web based classes with Say Something in Welsh and Duolingo. Menter Iaith groups in the area also offer a range of activities. Tŷ Croeso in Chepstow is the Welsh Society centre but has reduced opening times at present and U3A Chepstow have a weekly meeting in St Arvans. There is a monthly meeting of the Usk Welsh group in the Sessions House.

There is so much available such as literature, poetry, folk songs, radio and TV so I would urge you to join in and enrich your life and be able to speak with your grandchildren in Welsh. At the same time, you will be ensuring the future of one of the oldest living languages in Europe.
